Last May I was asked to speak at the graduation of two students at a small Christian elementary school. I was not asked because I was known as an excellent speaker, but because I had taught them catechism for the last four years. The principal asked if I could say a few words to encourage them; he didn't say in what way or which area. He left that up to me.

I thought of some of the areas a catechism teacher should encourage them. They ought to be obedient to their parents and to God, love their neighbor, and be a witness for Christ. Many of the discussions we had over the last four years came to mind. We had spoken about their lives and how God's word and God's people had played a part in it. God is living and real and speaks to them, guides and comforts them. We talked about how the church of Christ plays an important role in raising them up in the fear of the Lord, and how the catechism that was written so long ago could be applied to the way you live the Christian life today. It shows them the sin that is ever present in their lives, the salvation God provides through Christ, and the service we give in thankfulness to Him. I had been encouraging them for the last four years, and wondered if ten or fifteen more minutes would make a difference.

In reviewing those past four years I realized how much they had encouraged me. It was a joy to see these young people grow and mature. God uses His church, parents and Christian schooling together to teach them doctrine and the Christian life. Many of their answers to my questions over the years were started with "My teacher said..." The instruction at school confirmed again and again what they were being taught in catechism and being preached from the pulpit. The three legged stool of church, home and school was effective, and to witness it for four years was a great encouragement to me.

I looked up the meaning of the word "encourage" in the dictionary and it was defined as "to give courage to" and "urge on." I then asked my students what they were afraid of as they left the 8th grade and moved on. Their united answer was that they feared the future; they didn't know about high school and what would happen to them. They worried about being able to make new friends. The uncertainty of the future was their greatest fear.

This brought us to a discussion from the catechism in Lord's Day 10 that speaks of God's

An entire semester has already passed. The time goes so fast, but we've learned so much! Kindergarteners are now reading. I trust Him so much that I do not doubt He will provide whatever I need for body and soul, and further, that whatever evil He sends upon me in this vale of tears, He will turn to my good; for He is able to do this because He is almighty God; He desires to do this because He is a faithful father."

What a comfort to know that God is not only able, but he also desires to provide all we need for body and soul. So for those of us who have fears about the school, the board, the teachers or the students, I suggest we use our catechism and look to the Lord who tells us, "Fear not, for I
